On Sunday 3rd September, the third edition of the **'Run for Tash' 10k** event took place at Odd Down Cycle Circuit in memory of TBAC's Natashia Lewis who sadly lost her life while out training on the roads 3 years ago. There was a splendid turnout of runners and spectators all raising funds for the Natasha Lewis Foundation that aim to support a variety of sporting clubs and athletes including TBAC.

With over 200 participants the race was won by Harry Waring of San Domenico Running Club in a time of 34:13 with TBAC's Dan Jones a close 2nd in a time of 34:36 and veterans Simon Brace and Jason Rowland 3rd equal in 35:55. First female finisher was Victoria Ratcliffe (2nd claim TBAC) in a time of 41:05 followed by TBAC's Marianne Carpenter in 2nd (41:52) and Jenny Carter 3rd in a time of 42:13.


Meanwhile at a very competitive **Cardiff 10k** Freya Spruit finished 4th female in a very strong time of 37:34 while veteran Jo Thompson took 1st FV 60 spot in a world-class time of 42:32.

At the **Big Half in London** Dan Soltys (1:29:22) paced Creina Oshea to a PB time of 1:29:10 breaking the 'magic' 90 min barrier. While TBAC 2nd claim Cameron Mcgarry also managed a big PB finishing in 1:17:57.

Further afield TBAC newcomer Ralf Goad was competing in the prestigious **UTMB ultramarathon** finishing 315th in a very solid time of 33:19:37.

And finally TBAC's Aiden Wiffen was competing for the Bath Amphibians at Ironman Wales finishing 99th in a time 11:32:52 with an impressive running marathon of 3:45.

More track & field 9 & 10th September


