Leon keeping his cool in Kona



Ironman World Championship, Kailua-Kona Hawaii (Men's Pro Race)

Leon Chevalier had a superb championship with a personal best Bike section after the swim which took him into podium contention at the start of the Run section. At one point Leon had worked his way into 2nd position behind the eventual winner Patrick Lange. The heat and humidity was brutal at this stage and unfortunately started to take it's toll on Leon, however he managed to rally and finished strongly in 4th position just 54 seconds behind 3rd placed Rudy Von Berg after 7 hours 46 minutes and 54 secs of racing (Swim: 50:43; Bike: 4:01:38; Run: 2:49:56). 


World Triathlon Age-Group Championships 19th October



The World Standard Distance Triathlon Championships took place on Saturday 19th in sunny Torremolinos. This was one of the most well-attended Championships I've been to, with some Age Groups containing over 125 athletes from many different countries.

The 1500m sea swim was mild but choppy, whipped up by a very brisk wind which added to the mayhem on the 3 laps of the busy 40k bike course (five Brits ended up in hospital from bike crashes). The final 10k run was an out-and back along the beach promenade, with a wall of supporters making for a great atmosphere and inspiring some strong finishes.

Natasha Perks did a brilliant final run (40:38) in the midday heat, to finish 14th in the 50-strong FV35. I was 6th out of 75 starters in the FV50, qualifying for next year's WC in Wollongong, Australia.
